Awards will be presented to all winners at an award ceremony scheduled for October 5 during softball games at Howell Field.



He also helped establish the Quality Assurance program. In addition, Baxter worked for a period of time in the Recreation program. He passed away in March of 1996, two weeks before his 50th birthday. A plaque, granite bench and marker are located at the Gym to honor his service at Sunland.






