



Be Everything and More!

Sunland Recreation reports a tremendous turnout at the inaugural BEAM (Be Everything And More) classes held September 19. A total of 67 residents participated in the class. Classes will be held every other Wednesday from 3 - 4 pm at the Gym. The class is open to residents from all three Units and Pathways. Instructor Tara Dent, R-DMT,GI-CMA, is well suited for this class, having prior experience working with individuals with physical and developmental challenges. Participants will enjoy an inspirational health and wellness curriculum that employs music and movement to promote and celebrate potential, strengthen body, mind and spirit connections; and move people into lighter and brighter ways of being in the world. Objectives of the class include: Reduce tension and stress levels through breathing, stretching, dance and structured exercise; Instill positive coping skills through the 4 B's (Brakes, Breath, Body and Brain) and impulse control and emotional regulation techniques; Increase confidence and self-esteem through body awareness exercises, self-expressive movements; Expand movement repertoire and Increase unity and camaraderie through group rhythmic activity, team building exercises and group celebration dances.





She began her volunteer work with children who participated in Special Olympics, because of her friend Susan. Susan was diagnosed with Cerebral Palsy and helped with Special Olympics. Because of Susan, Geri Williams was inspired to get involved. That friendship set the stage for decades of public service. Throughout her career, she has strongly advocated for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities and mental health challenges. Sunland Center was blessed to have her serve as our Superintendent for 4 ½ years.

Mrs. Williams has been a strong force for good at Sunland. Upon her arrival, she invested the necessary time to study and assess the operations of the Center, to get to know the staff, residents, their families and many within the Jackson County community. She quickly earned our respect and our trust. She demonstrated what it means to serve, and she conveyed the most important message that it is truly *our privilege to serve* those who call Sunland home. Under Mrs. Williams' lead, Sunland has thrived with new life and new opportunities for staff and residents. She never accepted the status quo; she encouraged us to be better, to grow and be strong. And we are. Under her guidance and leadership, Sunland has expanded services and opportunities to include the Hub fine arts program, the performing arts, the Mixer culinary arts program, the annual Art in the Park, new initiatives for the precision execution of the annual Fall Festival, building and strengthening community partnerships, leadership and professional growth opportunities, grounds restoration and beautification, communications expansion, job fair for the recruitment of key positions across the Center, recreational and social inclusion opportunities for residents, and much, much more. She directed the Center with a calm, steadfast assurance during the devastation of Hurricane Michael, never faltering or leaving the residents and staff who looked to her for guidance and stability. Lessons from Sunland's Majestic Oak



The majestic oak at Sunland has always been an icon, representative of the beauty and strength of the Center. The grand oak has withstood the tests of time, offering shade and tranquility, and a place of final rest for many former residents whose ashes have been scattered there. It is a place of beauty and a haven of peace. In its pre-hurricane state, the massive tree was beautiful, thick with green leaves and Spanish moss, beckoning passersby to linger for a moment to enjoy its beauty. When the hurricane blew across the Center, many were fearful that our beloved oak had succumbed to the destructive high winds. Yet, when the storm had passed, there she stood. Strong and proud! She had withstood the storm for her roots run deep! When an oak has a good root system, the winds of adversity actually strengthen rather than topple it. In times of drought, the roots sink even deeper to find the water needed to nourish the tree.
